Introduction: Four Mobile Clinics in Northern Syria

The Idlib governorate is home to 3 million people, of which 2 million are in need of humanitarian aid. The humanitarian situation is dire. Hospitals are understaffed; medicine and medical equipment are unavailable; parents and children are in desperate need of life-saving care.

In partnership with Islamic Relief, UOSSM has established 4 mobile clinics in the Idlib governorate, which aim to improve the accessibility of primary health care services. Mobile clinics can provide medical care to isolated communities to whom a hospital or medical facility is not accessible. Moreover, the mobile clinics provide essential mental and community health services to both internally-displaced Syrians and their host communities. The project ran from May-August 2018, and has been extended recently.

The establishment of these mobile clinics would not have been possible without your help and support.

August 2018: Budget and Expenses

UOSSM has erected four mobile clinics which serve citizens in Northern Syria. The budget for this project totaled \$99,993.00, which was used to finance:

- 1. The operating cost of the mobile clinics (example: fuel)
- 2. Purchase of consumables, medicine, and equipment
- 3. Employee salaries for doctors and support staff working at the mobile clinic.

The clinics offered many services such as primary health care, support for patients of malnutrition, advocacy for community health and mental health support services. The table below shows the monthly and cumulative beneficiaries.

- Additional Support Staff






Number of Consultations in Clinics

The mobile clinics are an integral part of primary healthcare in Idlib, because they provide health services to remote communities, displaced families, and other vulnerable communities. The majority of the beneficiaries are internally displaced and below the poverty line.

Of 4,623 consultations in clinics, nearly two-thirds (2,952) of them were in general medicine and one-third (1,671) of them were in the area of gynecology.




Mental Health Consultations in Clinics


Mental health consultations were conducted in the following cities:



Number of MUAC Cases

MUAC, or Middle-Upper Arm Circumference, is used for the assessment of nutritional status. It is reportedly the best indicator of malnutrition and infant mortality.

- Red MUAC refers to acute malnutrition, consisting of 33 cases.
- Yellow MUAC refers to moderate malnutrition, consisting of 104 cases.
- Green MUAC indicates well nourished, consisting of 2,418 cases.

Mobile community health teams examined all children between the ages of 6-59 months, pregnant and nursing woman. Accordingly, the patients were provided with nutrition counseling and treatment. Children and mothers with moderate to severe acute malnutrition received Ready-to-Use Therapeutic Food such as Plumpy'Nut. .



Total Diseases: Chronic





